You Can Help Protect the Acadia National Park Viewshed!

A 195-foot cell tower has been proposed for Buttermilk Brook Road on Freeman Ridge in Southwest Harbor, near the border of the park. This tower would be 70 feet higher than the existing tallest cell tower on Mount Desert Island.

Friends of Acadia is concerned about the potential negative impact on the public experience offered by Acadia's



hiking trails and mountain-tops and encourages you to take part in a visual simulation now planned for the morning of Monday, March 18, weather permitting, and then to share your comments with those reviewing the application.
