

Dear Friends,

After a cold, damp spring, the forecast for the upcoming holiday weekend looks gorgeous, and with temperatures nearing 80 today, it feels like summer is just around the corner. Acadia's mountainsides and valleys are bursting into bloom with Shad bush and Rhodora just beginning to pop. Animals are beginning to emerge, too: barred owlets have made their fuzzy appearance near Sieur de Monts, and a black bear, a species rarely seen on MDI, was spotted enjoying the warm summer-like night temperatures on a lawn in Bass Harbor.

Like spring's slow arrival this year, Acadia National Park is experiencing slight delays in starting typical springtime operations. Most park staff have been working from home to comply with state orders to help slow the spread of COVID-19. Mother Nature took a significant toll on park facilities over the winter with washouts and blowdowns on the carriage roads and rockfalls along park roadways that will slow their re-opening.

There is no doubt that this coming summer will be different than any in Acadia's history. Anyone traveling to Maine from out-of-state is being asked to quarantine for two weeks upon arrival to help prevent community transmission of the virus. The park and FOA are taking these guidelines very seriously, and all out-of-state seasonal staff are sheltering in place for two weeks upon arrival. In addition, many of FOA's traditional in-person events will go virtual this summer to help keep you safe. We will miss seeing you in person, but you can stay connected to Acadia no matter where you are. Read on for more.

Stay Up-to-Date with the Latest **Park Information**

Memorial Day weekend is usually the first busy weekend of the season here in Acadia. In a typical year, park facilities and roads would be open, and visitors would be able to access all areas of the park. This year park roads remain closed to vehicular traffic until June 1 when a phased reopening is planned. Facilities are also closed so no bathrooms or trash receptacles are available. Recreational access is open to pedestrians and bicyclists on roads as well as limited hiking on trails; however, Acadia's carriage roads remain closed until further notice. As ANP crews return to work, they will need uninterrupted time to work safely and efficiently on blowdowns, trenches and other hazards caused by winter storms. Violations of the closure may delay repairs. The long exposure photographs expand time and allow the moon's illumination to reveal a mystical scene in an otherwise dark landscape. This project embodies Acadia's quiet stillness, intense power, and serene solitude.

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Opportunity to Comment on National Park Service E-Bike Regulations

The National Park Service (NPS) is accepting public comment until June 8, 2020 on proposed national regulations surrounding the definition and uses of e-bikes within national parks. These regulations would formalize the national policy guidance that was issued last fall that e-bikes should be



allowed in areas where regular bicycles are allowed. Because Park Superintendents were required then to develop policies specific to their parks, Acadia Superintendent Kevin Schneider opted to allow only Class 1 e-bikes (requiring that the operator pedals the bike and the motor stops assisting at speeds of 20 MPH) on the carriage roads and Schoodic's multi-use paths, while also continuing to allow all classes of e-bikes on park motor roads. The current NPS comment period is not specific to Acadia, but could affect Acadia's implementation of the regulations, depending on whether/how the national regulations are changed.
