

Celebrating Progress in Seasonal Housing

This spring, thanks to the support of our members, seasonal employees working in Acadia moved into new housing at the Dane Farm and Jordan River Road campuses. Seasonal employees, along with Acadia's full-time staff, are critical for every aspect of park opperations, from visitor services and trail and carriage road



maintenance to habitat restoration. Accessible housing addresses a critical need, allowing Acadia to attract and retain the skilled seasonal staff it needs to make the park shine.

This year's seasonal staff quickly turned this housing into a home. <u>In this video</u>, Rhiannon Johnston, one of our incredibily talented seasonal staff members, shares what this housing meant to those who lived there.

Building on this momentum, construction is underway in Acadia National Park on the most ambitious housing initative yet: a 56-bedroom facility at <u>Harden Farm in</u> <u>Bar Harbor</u>. Together, these projects represent significant progress toward our long-term goal of creating 130 new beds to support Acadia's future.

Before-and-After Photos From This Season's Carriage Road Vista Clearing

This season, Friends of Acadia drop-in volunteers and service groups helped park staff restore 12 of the park's historic carriage road vistas. Crews trimmed branches and cleared brush to renew the views, which were designed in the 1920s and '30s in tandem with the carriage roads.



In keeping with each vista's original design, some unfold as sweeping views of the coastline and ponds, while others are intentionally subtle, offering quiet glimpses of features beyond the trees.


Acadia Magazine - In Mailboxes Now

Seasonal Closures in Acadia

Most of the Park Loop Road is now closed until the spring, but it remains open to winter activities, such as walking, cross-country skiing, biking, and snowmobiling. The Park Loop Road will remain open to motor vehicles between Jordan Pond Road in Seal Harbor and the Jordan Pond parking lot and between Schooner Head Road and Otter Cliffs Road in Bar Harbor.



When visiting Acadia in winter, being prepared for cold weather, early darkness, and icy conditions will help ensure a safe and enjoyable experience.

National Parks 2026 Appropriations Update:

The Fiscal Year 2026 appropriations process remains unresolved as Congress works against a January 30 continuing resolution (CR) deadline to fund the government for the full year. Lawmakers have advanced several individual spending bills through committee, including separate House and Senate versions of the Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies bill, which funds the National Park Service, but no full-year appropriations package has been enacted. Agencies covered by the Interior bill are operating under the CR at Fiscal Year 2025 funding levels while House-Senate differences are negotiated. Congress must reconcile these differences and pass final legislation to avoid additional CRs, funding uncertainty, and another government shutdown.

Friends of Acadia continues to call for full funding and full staffing for national parks.
