

Brief: FOA Meeting with Legislators

This week, leadership from Friends of Acadia and Schoodic Institute met with legislators in Washington, D.C., to advocate for sufficient park staffing, including a lift of the hiring freeze currently affecting full-time park staff and more than 150 seasonal positions within Acadia. Members of Maine's delegation expressed their commitment to Acadia National Park,



and Representative Chellie Pingree followed up with <u>a letter</u> urging Interior Secretary Doug Burgum to resume all seasonal hiring immediately.

Additionally, FOA spoke with lawmakers about the continuing need for affordable park workforce housing and the importance of renewing the Great American Outdoors Act, a bipartisan bill that's helped national parks, including Acadia, address crippling maintenance backlog issues.
