



12 Outdoor Classroom Grants Awarded

2025 was another successful year for our Outdoor Classroom grant program! Grants were awarded to 12 Maine schools, most of which were in the Acadia region. These grants support the creation of outdoor learning spaces on Maine's public school campuses so that students benefit from time spent in nature and curriculum that builds connections to Acadia National Park. Research has shown that outdoor learning can improve emotional regulation and lead to higher academic outcomes.



"National parks are amazing outdoor classrooms, and school campuses can be, too!" said Paige Steele, FOA's Acadia for All director and facilitator of the Outdoor Classroom grants. "A big part of having an outdoor classroom is teaching students how to engage with the outdoors and helping them learn foundational skills. That might include how to dress for the weather, Leave No Trace principles, and the appropriate responses to outdoor stimuli—particularly for students who have not previously had much exposure to the outdoors."

The Acadia Teacher Fellows program is a unique professional development opportunity for K-12 educators to gain hands-on experience in Acadia National Park. Teacher fellows work side-by-side with interpreters, researchers, patrol rangers, resource managers, trail crews, and other specialists. The 2026 program will run from July 5 - August 1.




Teacher fellows develop lesson plans based on their park experience and, when they return to their schools in the fall, share their projects with students and colleagues.

Advocacy Update

On January 8, the House passed a bipartisan "minibus" appropriations package, advancing the Fiscal Year 2026 Interior and Environment bill toward a final Senate vote. This compromise provides \$3.27 billion in flat funding for National Park Service operations, successfully blocking a proposed \$1 billion cut from the administration.



The legislation includes directives for the National Park Service to prioritize staff retention following a 24% loss in the permanent workforce last year. It also mandates congressional notification for any mass firings or agency reorganizations. While securing \$900 million for the Land and Water Conservation Fund and increasing transparency for infrastructure repairs, the final text omits language prohibiting the sale of federal parklands. Congressional leaders now aim to finalize the package before the January 30 funding deadline to avert a shutdown.

Park Updates:

- The National Park Service has **updated its annual pass and entrance fee pricing**. Pricing for U.S. residents remains unchanged, while non-U.S. residents are subject to a new surcharge. [Visit the park's website for a full list of fees](#).
- The National Park Service has updated its [fee-free day schedule for 2026](#).
- **Most of the Park Loop Road is now closed until the spring**, but it remains open to winter activities, such as walking, cross-country skiing, biking, and snowmobiling.
- **The Park Loop Road will remain open to motor vehicles between Jordan Pond Road in Seal Harbor and the Jordan Pond parking lot** and between Schooner Head Road and Otter Cliffs Road in Bar Harbor.
