

Government Reopening

The government shutdown ended Wednesday night (November 12) allowing National Park Service staff at Acadia and at national parks around the country to return to work. The shutdown lasted 43 days, the longest in history. More than half of Acadia's staff were furloughed.

We are thankful that furloughed staff can return to the park and that everyone who was not paid during the shutdown will receive back pay. The continuing

resolution funds the Department of Interior at the current level through Jan. 30. We continue to work with our congressional delegation to stress the importance of stable funding and staffing for the National Park Service and the need to lift the hiring freeze.

During the shutdown, Acadia National Park was unable to sell park passes or collect entrance fees during one of the busiest times of the year. Entrance fees are a critical funding source for a wide range of visitor services and maintenance projects, including trail work, custodial services, and infrastructure repairs.
