Located along Route 3 in Trenton, this new facility is now open and welcoming visitors to Downeast Maine and Acadia National Park. This intermodal transportation center is the perfect place to park your car, purchase your park pass, learn about places to visit, and hop on the Island Explorer bus.

This year's event will follow a "hybrid" model with groups meeting out in the field at their assigned work sites at the beginning of the day and coming together in the afternoon for a tasty lunch of chili and cider! Advocacy Update

On August 21, Friends of Acadia submitted comments to the U.S. Department of Transportation urging the agency to strengthen investments in transportation programs that benefit national parks. Our recommendations included increased funding for the Federal Lands Transportation Program and Emergency Relief for Federally Owned Roads, along with expanded



eligibility for competitive funding sources that could support projects in Acadia. You can find FOA's comments here.

Help Stop Invasive Plants - Become a Backyard Steward

Backyard Stewards is a new community initiative that helps MDI residents to identify and remove invasive plants in their own backyards. The program offers online resources like identification and removal guides, native replacement guidance, as well as a directory of landscaping professionals and plant nurseries that



have joined the program to help support their community.

• **Identify:** Learn to identify invasive plants that might be growing in your backyard.

- **Take action:** Remove these disruptive species and consider replacing them with native plants.
