American Aquafarms Appeals State Decision

In April 2022, the Maine Departments of Marine Resources (DMR) and Environmental Protection decided to terminate consideration of American Aquafarms' applications to lease two 60-acre sites in Frenchman Bay for industrial-sized salmon farms. The reason for termination was that



American Aquafarms failed to provide a licensed, approved source of eggs for their farms.

The company has since appealed DMR's action in Cumberland County Superior Court, calling the agency's decision "arbitrary and capricious."

While we wait for the court case to proceed, Friends of Acadia continues communication with its partners who have been working to defeat the salmon farm proposal. We will also be reaching out to multiple stakeholders to look for consensus on long-term legislative or regulatory solutions to prohibit industrialsized, non-sustainable salmon farms from happening.

We'll continue to provide updates in E-News and on our website as is warranted.
