Great Meadow Public Comment

As you likely know, Friends of Acadia has been working in partnership with the National Park Service and Schoodic Institute in the Great Meadow Wetland for more than six years as part of its Wild Acadia initiative.

The National Park Service, in collaboration with its partners, has developed a comprehensive climate-



smart restoration plan for the 116-acre wetland. Monitoring and research within the park have identified Great Meadow as a poor-quality wetland because of its high abundance of invasive plants, hydrological disturbance, and external stressors from generations of development. The purpose of the climate-smart restoration plan is to improve the natural function and species diversity of the wetland, while reducing damage and maintenance to park facilities.

Project plans include replacing the culvert at the outflow of the Great Meadow, restoration of Cromwell Brook, removal of non-native invasive plant species with native plant restoration, targeted wetland restoration, and visitor-use improvements to increase accessibility and enjoyment of the area.

The park is hosting a public meeting where you can learn more specifics about the project on **Wednesday, November 16, 2022, at 7:00 p.m. at the YWCA Mount Desert Island** (36 Mount Desert Street, Bar Harbor, ME 04609). 
