Cadillac Summit Road to Close November 14

The Cadillac Summit Road will close to



all traffic, including pedestrians and bicyclists, for the season beginning November 14 for road repairs and culvert replacements. The closure will allow workers and oversized vehicles access to the historic road without endangering staff and visitors. The project's timeline is weather

College Prep in Chicago visited Acadia as part of the “Teens Take on Climate” program. The program is a Chicago based nonprofit that “connects diverse teens with climate education, employment and opportunities to succeed on inclusive, interdisciplinary climate pathways.” While in Acadia, they learned about the geological history and future of Acadia, explored summits carved by passing ice sheets, and helped remove invasive European green crabs and Asian shore crabs from coastal waters.
